Billy Class

We had a wonderfully exciting day on Wednesday where we joined together with Angora and Alpine to take part in activities based around the story, 'The Tin Forest,' by Helen Ward. The children loved working with the older pupils and have each produced a piece of writing inspired by the day!

Phonics next week: longer words. We will teach the children to use the **chunking method** to read words that are more than one syllable. For example, when reading the word 'laptop', we will chunk it into 'lap' and 'top' and then put them together to read the word.

We will send home new Phase 3 tricky words for you to practise at home with your child. This includes information on how we teach the tricky words.

Next week we will be continuing with our Boats DT project. For this, we ask that each child speaks to you about the different resources that they will need. These will mostly be items of junk modelling such as clean, used plastic bottles, cardboard boxes, clean & empty yoghurt pots etc. They may also need some tin foil or old plastic bags that can be re-used to make their boats. Please can we ask that

these resources are brought into school in a named bag at the start of next week. Thank you so much!

Alpine Class - Year 2

The Tin Forest: on Wednesday, Billy, Angora and Alpine joined together for an exciting writing day inspired by 'The Tin Forest' by Helen Ward. We started the day by discovering a magical tin forest between our classrooms and the library, which we were able to explore together before gathering in Billy Classroom to hear the story together. Then there were lots of fun activities throughout the morning to prompt a final writing piece at the end! We were so proud of our children for using all their year 2 writing skills to produce some amazing sentences!

The children are working hard on their understanding of money and are doing really well at remembering to differentiate between pounds and pence when adding the amounts. We will continue to practise this throughout the year; we are lucky enough to have access to a barcode scanner and a fun, home-made app with which we can play shopping during any free moments. Up until now we had only used this in terms of computing, but now we will be able to use play money to develop our financial skills too!

Did you know your children are now accomplished sewists (there's a new word for my vocabulary...apparently a common cross between sewing and artist) and have been busy sewing little pouches! Next week we will be decorating our pouches, and some children may even attempt a button to fasten, after which the children will be able to bring home their finished pieces to show off to you!

We are enjoying our daily reading; 20 minutes at the end of the day in which the children sit and relax, or colour while listening to a story. We have had two wonderful parents in this week to read to the children, and the class have absolutely loved it and would love to have some more parents in to read with us sometimes. So, if you have a book you love to read with your child and would be available to come a little early to pick-up (around 3pm) to read it to the class, please let us know via email to the office! 


